



Italy power storage options

Does Italy need electricity storage?

As Italy's energy mix is increasingly composed of variable renewable energy sources, electricity storage will be needed to integrate power generated by renewables into the national grid and make it available when sun and wind energy are not accessible.

Does Italy sell energy storage as a service?

Energy Storage by Service Use Type (Sandia National Laboratories) Italy is one of the top markets in the EU for energy storage and is primed for growth. The Italian TSO, Terna, has been investigating selling energy storage as a service.

Are battery energy storage systems needed in Italy?

Therefore, battery energy storage systems (BESS) are needed in Italy. The Italian market for BESS is growing rapidly and currently amounts to 2.3 GW but it almost exclusively consists of residential scale systems, associated with small scale solar plants, having a capacity of less than 20 kWh.

Is Italy receptive to energy storage?

The International Battery & Energy Storage Alliance have summarized the reality of Italy's untapped energy storage market as follows: "With high solar output of 1,400 kWh/kWp, net residential electricity prices around 23 cent/kWh and currently no FIT, the Italian energy market is considered to be highly receptive for energy storage."

How many storage systems are there in Italy?

More in detail, 311,189 storage systems were present in Italy in mid- 2023, with a total power of 2,329 MW and a maximum capacity of 3,946 MWh. Terna (the high voltage grid operator) also holds systems totaling 60 MW in power and 250 MWh in capacity.

How many GW of battery storage will Italy have by 2050?

The remaining 3-4 GW is expected to come from utility-scale systems. By 2050, Italy aims to achieve 30-40 GW of storage capacity. There are significant regional differences in the adoption of battery storage systems across the country.

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The success of an auction for fast reserve grid services held by Italy's transmission system operator (TSO) indicates a strong appetite for battery storage, but market rules and regulations need some revision to capture that opportunity.

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Matteo Coriglioni, head of Aurora Energy Research Italy, said official data showed that as of the end of March, Italy had approved more than 2GW of energy storage projects, with another 8GW in the approval process.

Italy's NECP targets between 7.5 GW and 8.5 GW of energy storage by 2030, of which 4.5 GW is expected to come from customer-sited storage systems.²⁴ The remaining 3-4 GW is expected to come from utility-scale systems. By 2050, Italy aims to achieve 30-40 GW of storage capacity.

Consequently, Italy faces the imperative of deploying extensive energy storage systems to effectively integrate its vast renewable energy infrastructure. Residential storage installations in Italy are particularly sensitive to policy changes.

He says the recognition that storage is needed to integrate Italy's big renewables pipeline has been combined with a capital market which is now more comfortable with and willing to invest in energy storage.

Italy's appetite for energy storage seems to be growing by the month. The country is one of just a handful in Europe that includes energy storage in its national energy and climate plan, with a target of 6 GW of capacity by 2030.

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
