What is the latitude and longitude of Switzerland?

Switzerland lies between latitudes 45° and 48° N, and longitudes 5° and 11° E. It contains three basic topographical areas: the Swiss Alps to the south, the Swiss Plateau or Central Plateau, and the Jura mountains on the west.

How did Switzerland get its name?

The Swiss began to adopt the name for themselves after the Swabian War of 1499, used alongside the term for "Confederates", Eidgenossen (literally: comrades by oath), used since the 14th century. The data code for Switzerland, CH, is derived from Latin Confoederatio Helvetica (Helvetic Confederation).

What is Switzerland known for?

Switzerland holds an international reputation for its established banking sector, alongside its distinctive recognition for their watchmaking and chocolate production. It has four main linguistic and cultural regions: German, French, Italian and Romansh.

When did Switzerland become a country?

Switzerland was formed in 1291 by an alliance of cantons against the Habsburg dynasty--the Confoederatio Helvetica (or Swiss Confederation), from which the abbreviation CH for Switzerland derives--though only in 1848, when a new constitution was adopted, was the present nation formed.

Is Swiss German spelled y or ii?

The long [i:] of Swiss German is historically and still often today spelled 'y' rather than 'ii', preserving the original identity of the two names even in writing. The Latin name Confoederatio Helvetica was neologised and introduced gradually after the formation of the federal state in 1848, harking back to the Napoleonic Helvetic Republic.
